Dr. Howard, the 24th President of Hampden-Sydney College, is a distinguished graduate of the US Air Force Academy, where he earned a BS in political science. A Rhodes Scholar, he earned his Doctorate in politics at Oxford University and an MBA with distinction from the Harvard Business School. At the Academy he received the Campbell Award (previously known as the Draddy Award), the highest academic award in the country presented to a senior football player.

Before his appointment as President of Hampden-Sydney College in 2009, Dr.

Howard served as Vice President for Leadership & Strategic Initiatives at the University of Oklahoma, where he also served as the Director of the Honors College Leadership Center and a President's Associates Presidential Professor.

Dr. Howard was a 2012 honoree of Dominion Power's Strong Men and Women: Excellence in Leadership Series. He was named a 2010 African-American Trailblazer in Virginia History by the Library of Virginia. He has been featured on NPR's All Things Considered and interviewed on CNN, PBS, and PRI's The Tavis Smiley Show.

## Pro Bono service opportunities abound in Richmond

*"Equal justice under law is not merely a caption on the facade of the Supreme Court building, it is perhaps the most inspiring ideal of our society. It is one of the ends for which our entire legal system exists... it is fundamental that justice should be the same, in substance and availability, without regard to economic status."*

A recent publication by the Virginia State Bar highlighted the growing concern about the "Justice Gap" – the lack of access to needed legal services brought about by lack of economic resources. While legal aid budgets and staff tighten, and needs increase as the poverty population in Virginia grows, the gap widens. As Virginia attorneys we are called to pro bono service, both by our professional values and obligations, and by our formal ethical rule obligations. Rule 6.1 of the Rules of Professional Conduct calls for every Virginia lawyer to render at least 2 percent per year of his or her professional time to pro bono legal services.

Here in the Capital City, there are pro bono service opportunities available in a wide variety of substantive areas to suit any interest and experience level. One barrier often cited by those who want to get involved in pro bono service but do not is that they do not know where to start. We are here to help with that. By highlighting a few

## Pro Bono needs are great - programs to help are available

opportunities here, we invariably neglect many worthy alternatives. But hopefully by shining a spotlight on a few examples, we spark an interest and encourage a few more of you to get involved in pro bono legal work.

Technology has made pro bono work easier and more accessible. JusticeServer is an exciting new technology that allows attorneys to accept and work on pro bono cases right from their own computers. It is a collaboration of the [Greater Richmond Bar Foundation \(GRBF\)](#), the [Legal Aid Justice Center \(LAJC\)](#) and [Central Virginia Legal Aid Society \(CVLAS\)](#). The on—line case management and referral system offers volunteer attorneys the opportunity to partner with Legal Aid to provide services to non-profit organizations in areas including consumer, education, elder, employment, family, and housing law in Richmond, Petersburg, Charlottesville, and surrounding cities and counties. Participating is easy – from the [JusticeServer](#) webpage an attorney can register and then begin accepting cases from the online database as time and interest permit. Most of the cases take between 5-15 hours to complete, and on-line training and resources are available in each of the substantive areas.

Serving alongside students is a rewarding aspect of this work, and we are fortunate to have a great resource in Richmond. Since 2007, the Harry L. Carrico Center for Pro Bono Service has worked to connect University of Richmond Law Students with pro bono programs throughout the community under the leadership of Director Tara Casey. You can find a description of the various projects and information on how to get involved on the [Center's website](#). The examples below highlight the diversity of these impactful programs.

Ben Pace, Esq. is a litigator at Williams Mullen who volunteers at the LAJC's Housing Project and the CVLAS No Fault Divorce Program. These cases can involve everything from trial and appellate work, to providing some legal advice to help a client resolve a dispute with a landlord. He is also Williams Mullen's Pro Bono Committee Chair, a role that allows him to help others fulfill their pro bono obligations. Ben described the value of his work: "First and

foremost, I enjoy doing real legal work for real people. Commercial litigators are often isolated from the real world, where people are fighting in the same legal system we work in simply for a roof over their heads. Also, as a litigator, any work that gets you in court is good for you."

Cullen Seltzer, Esq. practices in the Business and Professional Litigation group at Sands Anderson. His pro bono service includes work with the Criminal Appeals Program, partnering with Richmond Law Students through the Carrico Center. "I like two things mainly. First, working with law students is lots of fun. Explaining to a new lawyer why it is we do this thing and not some other thing forces you to think through those choices and figure out how to explain them aloud. I hope it's a learning experience for the students. I know it is for me. Second, criminal appellate litigation is interesting work. Thinking and writing about the Constitution and about the interplay of the government and its citizens is a pretty remarkable opportunity. Being able to apply skills and training to a project like that, to clients who have a demonstrable need (and who, incidentally, are none too popular) is a real privilege."

Catharyn Oroszlan, Esq. has been practicing at Brown Greer since 2012. She represents domestic violence victims at protective order hearings. Catharyn became involved with this work through the Domestic Violence Project ("DVP"), a committee of the Virginia Bar Association's Young Lawyers Division, which she now chairs. The DVP, in partnership with McGuireWoods LLP, coordinates pro bono representation to domestic violence victims seeking protective orders who qualify for assistance from the Central Virginia Legal Aid Society ("CVLAS"). "I find that protective orders are well-suited for pro bono service because these matters involve a short-term representation, usually requiring a single court appearance. This means that the time I dedicate to pro bono work is based primarily on the quantity of pro bono cases that I accept rather than the complexity of the case. In addition, due to the quick turn-around on protective orders, I usually receive a referral from CVLAS the week before the hearing. At that point, I already know what I have scheduled for the following week and can easily determine my availability."

Catharyn shared some advice on getting started with pro bono service: "It is much easier to get involved with pro bono work than one might think, and it does not need to become a huge time commitment. I started just by attending a free CLE training for protective orders. I was able to learn the basics of protective orders before deciding to become involved with the DVP, and from there I decided on my level of involvement. There are many other similar pro bono opportunities that allow for discrete time commitments and do not require significant training."

The rewards of a job well done are many. "Most recently, I was able to obtain a two-year protective order for a woman whose ex-husband physically abused her following the finalization of their divorce. She feared for her own safety, but she did not want her children to lose contact with their father. We asked that the court grant her a two-year protective order against her ex-husband that provided for supervised visits only with their children, which the court granted. We were both pleased with the outcome because it provided her with the protections that she wanted and allowed her children to maintain a relationship with their father while ensuring their physical safety."

Mahatma Gandhi famously said: "The best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others." Your training and talents as an attorney give you a unique opportunity to serve others in a way that can dramatically impact their lives for the better. The Richmond Bar Association website contains a helpful list of pro bono service resources and contacts to get you started on this important privilege and obligation of our profession.
